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COURSE DESCRIPTION

This seminar course examines the medical, social, legal, and educational impacts of HIV/AIDS on individuals, communities, society, and the world.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

- 1. Describe HIV/AIDS' etiology, epidemiology, prevention, clinical manifestations, testing, and treatments.
- 2. Describe HIV highest risk groups and infection control measures.
- 3. Develop an awareness of the social and psychological implication for individuals living with HIV infection and their families, support systems, communities, and society.
- 4. Examine the global impact of and response to HIV disease

COURSE MATERIALS

Textbook

This course does not require a textbook. However, supplemental readings are integral the course and are included in course modules

COURSE FORMAT

This course is 100% online and utilizes a variety of methodologies including but not limited to PowerPoint audio and video lectures, individual and multiparty activities, discussion board, and videos.

PowerPoints, for the most part, are simply outlines of the information presented in the audio lectures. Therefore, it is important for you to do the following:

- 1. Review each PowerPoint pdf in advance of the video lecture, paying close attention to the Learning Objectives
- 2. Take notes during the video lecture, focusing on the Learning Objectives.

Courses Assessments Overview

Discussion Board: Discussion Board activities will be utilized to encourage and facilitate critical thinking, community building, and demonstration of knowledge key concepts. Your responses must be clear, concise, credible, thoughtful, and considerate, and adhere to the mechanics of formal writing (spelling, grammar, etc.).

Additionally, each Discussion Board assignment will require you to read the responses posted by your classmates and respond to at least one of those postings.

Your initial posts, which will be responses to the discussion prompt, must be posted by **11:55 p.m. on** Wednesday of the week the Discussion Board is assigned. Your responses to the answers posted by other students are due 11:55 p.m. on the Friday of that week. Please note that the due date listed is the date for the response to a peer.

Each of your initial responses to the four Discussion Board assignments is worth 6 points and each of

your replies to the postings of your classmates is worth 4 points for a total of 40 points.

HIV Around the World Project. The project is composed of three major elements: (1) a research-based profile of a country, describing the impact of HIV disease on a country; (2) an original HIV- related public service announcement (PSA); and (3) an oral presentation of the Country Profile. The project is worth a total of 100 point.

Module Activities: You will complete ten Module activities, which have been designed to enhance and supplement the PowerPoint lectures. Each activity is worth 10 points for a total of **100 points**.

Quizzes and Exams: There will be two non-proctored quizzes and two proctored exams worth a total of 100 points, utilizing a combination of multiple-choice, true-false, and matching items format. The objectives for each PowerPoint lecture will be the focus for quizzes and exams.

The university policy for online assessments and proctoring is that any assessment equivalent to 15% or more of a student's final course grade should utilize online authentication and proctoring solution. This course utilizes Honorlock, UF's designated online proctoring service.

All previous module activities and assignments must be completed before you are able to go on to the next module and take a quiz or exam.
