Course Description

This course examines the principles of leadership and management in the sport setting.

Purpose of Course

This course is designed to explore the critical function of leadership in the management of sport organizations. Building from the academic foundations of industrial psychology, organizational behavior, and organizational theory, we consider the degree to which leadership is of strategic importance to organizational operations. We approach the topic from a variety of directions (including classical leadership theory, biographical studies, analyses of contemporary issues of leadership, philosophical debate, and personal experiences) and disciplines (both inside sport and out). In addition to gaining an advanced understanding of leadership theory and practice, students will consider their own approaches to leading organizations. This course will not produce new leaders. Instead, it will provide students with an environment to engage in critical thought, scholarly discourse, and philosophical debate about what it means to lead.

Course Objectives

After successfully completing this course, students should be able to:

1. Define leadership based on myriad attributes and actions rather than position in the organization
2. Identify examples of leadership from a number of unique perspectives
3. Apply classical leadership theory to contemporary management challenges
4. Collaborate with colleagues and propose real-world solutions to contemporary sport management issues
5. Develop personal leadership philosophies designed to guide future decision making
6. Recognize the scope of their own organizational influence as leaders in the sport industry

COURSE INFORMATION AND POLICIES

Course Format

This course is an online course and all class sessions (including discussion sessions) will be delivered through Canvas. The course is organized around weekly content, and four units make up each weekly content as follows:

1. Lectures
2. Readings
3. Quizzes
4. Discussion Questions

Lectures, Readings and Quizzes

Key concepts will be presented through brief lectures at the beginning of each module. Each lecture will provide an overview of the central ideas associated with specific concepts for each module. The primary purpose of the lecture is to lay the foundation of the various concepts and topics of sport mass media. The primary purpose of the readings is to further explore the specific topics or roles that pertain to sport mass media. A quiz covering the readings for each module will be administered prior to discussions.

Discussion Questions

Discussion questions are used to weave key concepts presented in the lectures and readings into an integrated whole in order to further develop an understanding of the phenomenon in sport. To successfully complete and fully participate in the discussion questions, students will have to do the following:

- View the lectures
- Read and understand the assigned readings prior to the beginning of a discussion
- Prepare and post answers (**150-200 word limit combined**) to the posted discussion questions
 - Two of the ten discussion questions must be answered via video (**2-3 minutes**)
 - If not completed, the last two weeks of discussions will be graded as a 0 and can't be dropped
- Respond to two discussions by supporting/disputing the views of others (**50-100 word limit each**)

In summary, each weekly content will include five key tasks:

1. *Watch* the lecture
2. *Read* the assigned readings
3. *Complete* the reading quiz
4. *Post* written responses to the discussion questions
5. *Post* your reaction to other student's discussion answer and interact with other students

PERFORMANCE EVALUATIONS

Leadership Dossier (Sports ManagerDISC Profile)**

Each student will complete the Sports ManagerDISC Profile, discuss the results, and use the results to develop a personal leadership growth plan by writing a mission statement for his/her life, identifying core values, showcasing his/her existing experience and professional goals, describing current leadership skills, developing a personal philosophy on leadership, and then describing an action plan for personal leadership development. (The Sports ManagerDISC Profile is an online sports assessment to support team managers, sports administrators and other professionals working in the sports industry, in their personal and professional development.) Specific assignment details and requirements will be provided via Canvas.

TED Talk Presentation

Students will be responsible for presenting a 6-9 minute TED Talk to the class on a Management and Leadership in Sport topic that teaches and moves the audience. The delivery of the TED Talk should be passionate, intentional, and include a storytelling component. The Talk must be supported by the use of two research articles from the top-tier sport management research journals. The topic must be submitted via the Canvas *Discussion* by the due date and approved by the instructor. Students will be required to view all of the group presentations by a specific date and will be required to comment on two other TED Talks via the *Discussions* link. Specific assignment details, requirements, and examples will be provided via Canvas.

Gator-To-Gator Leadership Connections

Students will explore leadership strategies through authentic interactions with alumni/ae, while learning about leadership in the real world. Each student will be assigned two UF TRSM alums. During the first few weeks of the semester, alums will be identified based upon goals and field of interest. You will be required to initiate communication with your matches and have two (2) conversations with the alums. The first will be a “get to know you” conversation, and you will submit an “alumni profile” on each alum. The second will be a semi-structured interview on “leadership in the real world”, and you will submit (1) a 100-word summary of takeaways from the conversation, and (2) a paper highlighting themes from the conversation, comparing those to themes you have discussed/read in the course. Then, you will be responsible for presenting a 5-6 minute presentation based on your interactions with your alumni. Specific assignment details and requirements will be provided via Canvas.

Reading Quizzes

There will be ten reading quizzes throughout the semester, and the two lowest grades will be dropped. Reading quizzes will consist of 5 questions and you will have 8 minutes to complete them. Reading quizzes will be available for a four day period via Canvas and are due by 11:59pm ET on the due date; however, you only get one opportunity to complete it. Reading quizzes are *open* note but to be completed individually. We are not responsible for computer/connection errors, so please make sure you use a reliable computer with a secure connection and take the quizzes earlier in the day to leave you more time in case there is an issue. If you do have technical difficulties, be sure to contact Learning Support Services and email me immediately with a screenshot of the issue.

Discussion Questions

There will be ten discussion questions throughout the semester, and the two lowest grades for each student will be dropped. The discussion questions will pertain to both lecture and reading materials for that week. The discussion questions will be available to you and answered in the *Discussions* link via Canvas. For every week discussion questions are due, each student must answer the questions in 150-200 words in combined length by Friday and post reactions that are 50-100 words in length each to at least two other students' posts by Sunday. For two of the discussions, the discussion questions (not reactions) must be answered by recording (not uploading) a 2-3 minute video recording via the “Record Media” icon in the *Discussions* link via Canvas. If not completed, the last two discussions will be graded as a 0 and cannot be dropped.

Exams

There will be two exams throughout the semester. The exams will consist of 5-7 short answer questions and you will have 40 minutes to complete them. Exams will be available for a four day period via Canvas and are due by 11:59pm ET on the due date; however, you only get one opportunity to complete it. Exams are *closed* note and to be completed individually. Please make sure you use a reliable computer with a secure connection and take the exams earlier in the day in case there is an issue because we cannot be responsible for technology errors. If you do have technical difficulties, contact Learning Support Services and email me immediately with a screenshot of the issue.

****Graduate Final Exam Requirement (ONLY for New Fall 2020 Students and beyond)**

During this course, the successful completion of the *Leadership Dossier* paper will fulfill a requirement of the Graduate Final Exam which is a requirement to be completed prior to the completion of the M.S. in Sport Management degree at the University of Florida. To successfully complete the *Leadership Dossier* paper, the student must earn a minimum of 80% on the assignment. A failure to meet the minimum of 80% will require the student to rewrite and resubmit the *Leadership Dossier* paper to the instructor by the stated deadline which will be before the end of the semester. However, the rewrite grade will not count towards the course but will count towards the successful completion of that Graduate Final Exam portion. A failure to successfully rewrite and resubmit the *Leadership Dossier* paper will result in earning an “Incomplete” (I) grade for the course until the requirement has been met. (Please note: An “Incomplete” (I) grade becomes punitive to your overall GPA approximately one semester following the assigned “Incomplete” grade.) It is the student’s responsibility to arrange with the instructor and agree in writing the timeline for successfully completing the *Leadership Dossier* paper in fulfillment of the Graduate Final Exam portion. If the student successfully earns a minimum of 80% on the first submission of the *Leadership Dossier* paper, then no further action is necessary.
