Course Description: This course is designed to: (1) Improve your vocabulary skills; (2) Prepare you for advanced professional preparation courses by incorporating content taught in advanced medical and scientific courses; (3) Provide you with multiple (3000) color medical pictures that will visually assist you in understanding why specific word parts were selected to form the thousands of specialized compound Medical, Scientific, and English terms discussed in this course; (4) Prepare you for professional school admission tests like the GRE, MCAT, PCAT & DAT.; (5) Provide you with the word part and compound term memorization, repetition, and reinforcement needed to assure mastery of this unique “**Language of Medicine,**” and finally, to (6) Provide you with an opportunity to study and replay the audio-visual online lectures and complete the self-testing activities at your convenience. In addition; free access to multiple medical web search engines (eg., webMD and more) is provided!

Course Overview: This is a three credit hour computer based classroom course. The **800 page** online printable textbook contains interactive audio-visual lecture pages that prepare each student for the **1000 self-testing flashcards** and the **800 multiple choice** self-test questions. These activities must be completed in full before you can take the final exam. **Ten timed e-tests will follow chapters 4 and 6-14; the sum of these tests will be worth 25% of your final grade** and is specifically designed to prepare you for your midterm (**which is 25% of your grade**) and your comprehensive final examination (**which is 50% of your final grade**).

2. **Course Objectives: The student will be able to:**

- A. Become fluent with meanings and use of medical terms.
- B. Spell and Define prefixes, suffixes, and stem words.
- C. Identify and Explain the function of specific, medical word parts.
- D. Describe how medical compound terms (words) are constructed.
- E. Build compound terms using multiple word parts in a combining form.
- F. Fracture and Analyze key compound medical terms in the Word Part Flashcards, Mult. Choice Questions, & Lecture Slides.
- G. Define key compound medical terms found on the flashcards, both “literal” meanings and “actual” meanings.
- H. Spell and Define medical equipment, treatment, disease, and diagnostic compound terms.
- I. Identify Visually & Describe Verbally, medical problems, disorders, conditions, and diseases.
- J. Improve comfort level when taking Prof. Admin. Exams (eg, GRE, MCAT, DAT, NCLEX, OAT, PCAT, GMAT, LSAT).
- K. Interpret and Understand medical course content, literature, records, and research.
- L. Interpret and Understand word (term) meanings from a wide variety of academic disciplines.

4. Course Outline

- A. View and listen to the Audio-Visual Lectures in Chapters 1 through 4.
- B. Complete the Multiple Choice Question Bank (over 100 Q's, 10 Items at a time) in Chapter 4.
- C. Learn, memorize, and complete the self-testing for the **1000** Flashcards in Chapter 5.
- D. **Come to class at the designated time and date (see syllabus item #10) and take a MIDTERM EXAM on Chapters 1-5 (the content is on your self-testing activities; specifically the multiple choice questions in Chapter 4, and true-false questions made from the flash card content in Chapter 5); 100 questions, total.**
- E. View and listen to the Audio-Visual Lectures for the Body Systems in Chapters 6-14. Complete the **800** Diseases and Disorders Multiple Choice Question Exercises and timed, formal tests for Chapters 6-14.
- F. **Come to class at the designated time and date (see syllabus item #10) and take a FINAL EXAM.** This final exam covers the **1000** Flashcard Word Part and Medical Abbreviation Meanings and the **800** Multiple Choice Questions (Chapters 1-14). It will consist of multiple choice questions from the multiple choice chapter exercises, and true/false questions from the flash cards; about **200 questions, total**. **Review your online chapter exercises, & practice writing out your flash cards (directly from the e-text; or, from the optional workbook) before the exam.**

5. Weekly Activities: Lectures, course work, tests, and exams; YOU MUST ADHERE CLOSELY TO THIS COURSE FLOW PLAN; waiting till the last minute to finish will decrease your ability to learn the information well; and may result in CRASHING the SERVER; so NO ONE CAN FINISH; late finishers will be penalized!

Your online practice exam must be taken by NOW! Make sure you are totally done with your coursework; before taking it, as this practice exam finishes out, and scores, your coursework. The practice exam MUST be completed by the end of this WEEK 13; NO LATER than ONE FULL WEEK BEFORE your Final Exam is scheduled. This gives you time to go back and review the chapter exercises and flash cards; after you are done with the practice exam; to help ensure you do well on the in-class final exam. This practice exam is scored for your own feedback; the score is NOT counted toward your coursework grade; but you need to complete this for your coursework grade to be calculated and sent to you! Putting this off till the last minute stresses the server; if you do this, and cause the server to go down; you will face penalty points.

Week 14 FINAL EXAMINATION IN ASSIGNED CLASSROOM on your section's date/time!

This final examination covers the **1000** Flashcard Word Part and Medical Abbreviation Meanings and the **800** Multiple Choice Questions (Chapters 1-14). It will consist of multiple choice questions from the multiple choice chapter exercises, and true/false questions from the flash cards. Be sure to review your on-line materials (chapter exercises), **and practice filling in the blanks (eg., flash cards) in the optional workbook** before the exam.

This required, in-class exam is worth 50% of your grade; it will be approximately 200 questions; See Section 4-F above, for final exam content information.

Week 15 Grade Review (optional).

This is the same time and room as your final exam; but held the next class session after the final exam; see ITEM #10 on this syllabus for the exact DATE. **Although you will be able to access your exam score online, you are ALSO welcome to come to class during this week to personally check your score with your instructor and/or to inquire about your exam and what you may have missed. THIS is your opportunity for these inquiries. Due to the vast numbers of people in this course, grade inquiries and grade disputes CANNOT and WILL NOT be entertained VIA EMAIL, phone, etc. So, come to your course section's meeting time-day-location (the week after your exam) for this.
