**Course description and objectives:** This is an advanced graduate exercise physiology course which focuses on the acute and chronic effects of exercise on the cardiovascular system. The course is designed to provide graduate students with a comprehensive understanding of the regulatory mechanisms controlling cardiovascular function at rest and in response to acute aerobic and resistance exercise. The course will also cover chronic cardiovascular adaptations to aerobic and resistance exercise training.

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to

- demonstrate knowledge and understanding of the regulatory mechanisms controlling cardiovascular function at rest and in response to acute aerobic and resistance exercise.
- demonstrate knowledge and understanding of the chronic cardiovascular adaptations to aerobic and resistance exercise training.
- critique/present research articles in the area of cardiovascular exercise physiology related with the material discussed in the lectures.

**Prerequisites:** While there are no specific prerequisites for this course, students are expected to possess strong undergraduate level knowledge of the structure and function of the cardiovascular system and basic concepts of cardiovascular exercise physiology.
