I. COURSE TITLE: PREVENTION AND CARE OF ATHLETIC INJURIES (3 CR.)

II. COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course will introduce the student to the basic concepts of prevention and care of sport-related injuries/illnesses for physically active populations. A background in human anatomy is required.

III. COURSE OBJECTIVES:

Upon completion of this course the student will be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate a basic understanding of the clinical approaches for the prevention, evaluation, recognition, and treatment of sport-related injuries/illnesses.
- 2. Demonstrate a basic understanding of the functional anatomy of the cervical and lumbar spine, and the upper and lower extremities.
- 3. Demonstrate a basic understanding of the pathoetiology, pathomechanics, pathophysiology, and signs and symptoms of acute and chronic sport-related injuries/illnesses.
- 4. Demonstrate a basic understanding of the medico-legal issues associated with sports health care.

Written examinations will be completed during class lecture and will be presented in a multiple choice format. Usually 50 questions in length. Questions will be taken from course lectures (and required readings). Exams are NOT cumulative and there is no final comprehensive examination.
