- ✓ Obtain basic proficiency in designing a study to answer a specific research question, including selection of population and recruitment methods, measures, analytic methods, and interpretation.

Graded Course Components

In-class activities and reading quiz (100 points)

Overview: We will engage in activities and discussion during class time.

- Students will get credit for engagement/completion of activity (typically this will be credit/no credit). Occasionally, some of these points will come from brief quizzes checking knowledge of assigned reading.
- There will be opportunity for credit in 12 class sessions, each worth 10 points. Your two lowest points will be dropped (e.g., you can miss up to 2 classes with credit and not lose points)
- *Example Activity:* In small groups, develop measurement items for a specified behavioral construct. Test items out on other class members using cognitive interviewing survey development methods. Discuss experience as a class.

Article processing tasks (90 points)

Overview: Students will read empirical research articles and answer key questions about reading in order to develop skills and knowledge relevant to class objectives.

- Students will answer a series of questions requiring close engagement with scientific research articles relevant to course topic.

Exams (180 points)

Overview: Students will complete three exams (60 pts each) to demonstrate mastery of course material.

- Exams will be short answer/essay format and require application of course material.
- The final exam will include new material from the second half of the class (~50% of total) and material from the first half (~50% of total).

Research study protocol (170 points)

Overview: Students will complete a series of assignments culminating in a complete research protocol.

- You will work on developing a plan for a research project. You will complete a series of assignments that will help you develop and draft your plan. Your final component will be a completed research protocol.

Research application assignment (30 points)

Overview: Students will complete an assignment involving interpretation of a research article.

- This project will involve engaging with and interpreting a research article.

PLEASE NOTE: All course components were developed such that use of AI systems/large language models (e.g., ChatGPT, Microsoft co-pilot) defeat the learning objectives. Thus, use of these systems is not allowed in any capacity unless explicitly indicated in writing by the instructor. If use of these tools is suspected, students may be subject to oral examination about the assignment and have points deducted for poor performance on oral exam.
